The average of 12.4 homicides per year, during the period of 1999 to 2007, has almost doubled to 23.9 per year during the period of 2008 to 2014. There were a total of 292 shooting victims in 2013 and 2014 alone. Wilmington now has the 4th highest homicide rate in the county, at 26.6 per 100,000 residents. The national rate is only 4.5. Shootings and homicides have become an overwhelming problem for the City of Wilmington and a bigger problem to police effectively.

The City of Wilmington's violent crime problem is severe and growing. In the last decade, the City has experienced a substantial increase in aggravated assaults, robberies, and most significantly homicides and shootings. Between 1999 and 2007, the City averaged 12.4 homicides per year. Between 2008 and 2014, the homicide rate has almost doubled to 23.9 per year. This is a substantial and telling increase, illustrating the current presence of violent crime in the City of Wilmington.

In 2013 and 2014, a total of 292 people were shooting victims. This is the highest shooting rate in any 2 year period in the City. Wilmington has now reached the 4th highest homicide rate in the country, at 26.6 homicides per 100,000 residents. The national rate is only 4.5 incomparison.

The Wilmington Police Department seeks funding to hire a crime analyst to track gun violence and gang involvement within the City. This analyst will then be tasked with developing profiles of "typical" shooting suspects. This in turn will drive the Department's proactive activities to reach a goal of a 10% reduction in gun crimes and gang violence, during the period of performance.
