President Shabazz: You're doing 49 or 54?

Council Member Harlee: This is 54.

Council Member Harlee: Madam President, I have an amendment as follows on Page 4, Section (b) to be stricken and replaced with the language: ***On the west side of North Shipley Street, beginning 30 feet south of the southerly building line of West 6th Street, and extending 20 feet south.***

Council Member Adams: I'd like to second that amendment ma'am.

President Shabazz: It's been seconded. I would like to take a voice vote on the amendment. So, I accept the vote on the replacement of the language that it be replaced by other language: On the west side of the North Shipley Street, between – beginning 30 feet south of the southerly building line of West 6th Street, and extend it 20 feet south. I'd accept the vote on that amendment. All those in favor signify by saying "Aye", any Oppose? Amendment accepted. Now we can have discussion on the Ordinance, As Amended.

Council Member Harlee spoke on the purpose of Ordinance No. 17-054 As Amended.

The Ordinance, **As Amended**, was read for the third and final time and was adopted by title and section recurring to the Enacting Clause and was passed by the following Yea and Nay Roll Call Vote: Yeas, Council Members Chukwuocha, Oliver, Harlee, Turner, McCoy, Williams, Freel, Adams and Dixon, and Council President Shabazz. Total, ten. Nays, none. Absent, Council Members Congo, Guy and Walsh. Total, three.

President Shabazz: Declare it adopted. Thank you Councilwoman.
Council Member Turner.

Council Member Turner: Yes, thank you Madam President. Madam President I have a Resolution to present.

Council Member Turner presented Resolution No. 18-001 (Agenda #4447) as follows:

WHEREAS, Wilmington City Council has enacted Section 2-3 of the Wilmington City Code regarding the authorization and procedures for naming City streets, parks, playgrounds, plazas, buildings, facilities, statues, monuments, and other lands reserved for public use in order to commemorate a particular person and his/her social significance to the City; and

WHEREAS, Section 2-3 states that if it is proposed that a part of, or any facility within, a street or reserved land that is subject to this section be named or renamed in honor of or dedicated to any person, place or event that is different from the rest of it or that is different than that within which it is located, such naming or renaming may be done by resolution of City Council pursuant to subsection (d) of this section, while retaining the name of the rest of the street or park or other reserved land within which the park facility or object so dedicated is located; and

WHEREAS, The William "Hicks" Anderson Community Center, located on the corner of 5th and Madison Street in Wilmington, was named in honor of William "Hicks" Anderson, a youth and community advocate who worked tirelessly to improve quality of life for residents living in the City's disadvantaged and underrepresented communities; and

WHEREAS, the Wilmington City Council and the community of West Center City wish to honor Matt Chittum, a life-long resident of West Center City and former basketball star, by naming the indoor basketball court at William “Hicks” Anderson Community Center (WHACC) the “Matt Chittum Court” while retaining the significance of the community center’s original name; and

WHEREAS, Matt Chittum’s accomplishments as a basketball player include winning several league championships while playing on the City’s youth league at WHACC and playing for an international league alongside such future celebrated players as Alonzo Mourning and Grant Hill; and

WHEREAS, although his promising career was cut short by a serious illness, Matt Chittum, or “Matty C” as he is affectionately known, continues to exemplify the values of good sportsmanship by acting as a positive role for youth in the community; and

WHEREAS, to honor his accomplishments both on and off the basketball court, the City of Wilmington has created a youth basketball league named the “Matt Chittum Basketball League” that is intended to further develop the skills and talent of the young men and women who regularly play basketball at WHACC while also fostering a sense of community and reinforcing the importance of education among these youths.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF WILMINGTON, that City Council hereby resolves to name the indoor basketball court at the William “Hicks” Anderson Community Center the “Matt Chittum Court.”

President Shabazz: Ordinance.

Council Member Turner: Sorry, I have another – I have an Ordinance to present and call for a third and final reading.

Council Member Turner presented and called for the third and final reading Ordinance No. 17-050 (Agenda #4458) entitled:

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHAPTER 36 OF THE
CITY CODE REGARDING WEAPONS AND RELATED
OFFENSES TO INCLUDE IMITATION FIREARMS

FISCAL IMPACT STATEMENT: This Ordinance has no anticipated fiscal impact.

Upon a motion of Council Member Turner, seconded by Council Member Williams, the above Ordinance was before the Council for its consideration. Council Member Turner spoke on the purpose of the Ordinance.

President Shabazz: Clerk will call the roll.

The Ordinance was read for the third and final time and was adopted by title and section recurring to the Enacting Clause and was passed by the following Yea and Nay Roll Call Vote: Yeas, Council Members Chukwuocha, Oliver, Harlee, Turner, McCoy, Williams, Freel, Adams and Dixon, and Council President Shabazz. Total, ten. Nays, none. Absent, Council Members Congo, Guy and Walsh. Total, three.

President Shabazz: Declare it adopted.

Council Member Turner: Thank you Madam President. Madam President, I have another Resolution to present.

Council Member Turner presented Resolution No. 18-002 (Agenda #4465) as follows:

WHEREAS, the Wilmington City council is committed to promoting public safety and reducing gun violence in the City of Wilmington; and

WHEREAS, firearms used to perpetrate crimes are often illegally obtained either through theft or through “straw purchases,” in which firearms are unlawfully purchased on behalf of persons not legally qualified to own, possess or purchase them; and

WHEREAS, to help reduce the proliferation of illegally-obtained firearms, the State of Delaware requires citizens to report the loss or theft of firearms to law enforcement within 48 hours; and

WHEREAS, in addition, committing a straw purchase in the State of Delaware can presently result in a class F felony conviction for a first offense, with more serious penalties for subsequent offenses; and

WHEREAS, House Bill 174, sponsored by Delaware State Representative John Mitchell, would amend Title 11 of the Delaware Code to raise the penalty for the first offense of purchasing or obtaining a firearm for someone not legally qualified to own, possess or purchase one from a Class F to a Class E Felony.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF WILMINGTON, that the Council strongly supports House Bill 174 and all related efforts to prevent and reduce the proliferation of illegally-obtained firearms.

Upon a motion of Council Member Turner, seconded by Council Members Williams and Freel, the above Resolution was before the Council for its consideration. Council Member Turner spoke on the purpose of the Resolution.

President Shabazz: Clerk will call the roll.

The Resolution was received, adopted as read and directed to be recorded and filed by the following Yea and Nay Roll Call Vote: Yeas, Council Members Chukwuocha, Oliver, Harlee, Turner, McCoy, Williams, Freel, Adams and Dixon, and Council President Shabazz. Total, ten. Nays, none. Absent, Council Members Congo, Guy and Walsh. Total, three.

President Shabazz: Declare it adopted.

Council Member Turner: Thank you Madam President. I also, have another Resolution to present.

Council Member Turner presented Resolution No. 18-003 (Agenda #4466) as follows:

WHEREAS, the Wilmington City Council is committed to promoting public safety and reducing gun violence in the City of Wilmington; and

WHEREAS, firearms used to perpetrate crimes are often illegally obtained through “straw purchases,” in which firearms are unlawfully purchased on behalf of persons not legally qualified to own, possess or purchase them; and

WHEREAS, committing a straw purchase in the State of Delaware can result in a class F felony conviction for a first offense, which can carry a penalty of up to three years’ incarceration, and for each subsequent offense can result in a class C felony conviction, which can carry a penalty of up to fifteen years’ incarceration; and

WHEREAS, committing a straw purchase is also a federal offense that carries a sentence of up to ten years’ incarceration and a fine of up to \$250,000; and

WHEREAS, to help deter potential offenders from committing straw purchases by educating them about the serious consequences of such acts, the National Shooting Sports Foundation, in partnership with the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives, created the “Don’t Lie for the Other Guy Program” in June of 2000; and

WHEREAS, the State of Pennsylvania enacted an ordinance in 2008 that established a state-wide straw purchase prevention education program to provide resources and direct grant money to the "Don't Lie for the Other Guy Program" and similar programs that offer straw purchase prevention education.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF WILMINGTON, that Wilmington City Council does hereby respectfully encourage the State of Delaware to follow Pennsylvania's lead and establish a state-wide straw purchase prevention education program to provide resources and direct grant money to the "Don't Lie for the Other Guy Program" and similar programs that offer straw purchase prevention education.

Upon a motion of Council Member Turner, seconded by Council Members Williams and Freel, the above Resolution was before the Council for its consideration. Council Member Turner spoke on the purpose of the Resolution.

President Shabazz: Clerk will call the roll.

The Resolution was received, adopted as read and directed to be recorded and filed by the following Yea and Nay Roll Call Vote: Yeas, Council Members Chukwuocha, Oliver, Harlee, Turner, McCoy, Williams, Freel, Adams and Dixon, and Council President Shabazz. President Shabazz: Declare it adopted.

Council Member Turner: Madam President, that's all I have tonight.
Thank you.

President Shabazz: Thank you Councilman Turner. Council Member McCoy.

Council Member McCoy: Ah nothing tonight Madam President.

President Shabazz: Council Member Williams.

Council Member Williams: No legislation this evening. Thank you.

President Shabazz: Council Member Freel.

Council Member Freel: I have no legislation this evening. I do have one Resolution for Council Member Walsh...

President Shabazz: Ok.

Council Member Freel: ...if you want to do at this point.

President Shabazz: ...we might as well do it now.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF WILMINGTON, that the Collective Bargaining Agreement between the CITY OF WILMINGTON and the FRATERNAL ORDER OF POLICE LODGE #1 CAPTAINS AND INSPECTORS for the term of July 1, 2017 through June 30, 2020, a copy of which is attached hereto and made a part hereof, is hereby approved, and the Mayor and City Clerk are hereby authorized to execute as many copies of said Agreement as may be necessary.

Upon a motion of Council Member Freel, seconded by Council Member Dixon, the above Resolution was before the Council for its consideration. Council Member Freel spoke on the purpose of the Resolution.

President Shabazz: Clerk will call the roll.

the Sanitation Department was thanked, sympathies expressed to the family of Barbara DelleDonne, residents were encouraged to come downtown, youths congratulated "On I have a Dream" project, Strategic Planning Process, Council going paperless and including but not limited to Council gearing up for budget process. In addition, it was announced that Council will meet again on January 18.
