LEGISLATIVE BUSINESS

President Gregory: Mr. Chukwuocha.

Mr. Chukwuocha: Nothing tonight Mr. President, thank you.

President Gregory: Mr. Darius Brown.

Mr. Darius Brown: Thank you Mr. President, nothing tonight.

President Gregory: Ms. Shabazz.

Ms. Shabazz: Nothing tonight Mr. President, thank you.

President Gregory: Mr. Prado.

Mr. Prado: Nothing tonight Mr. President.

President Gregory: Ms. Dorsey Walker.

Ms. Dorsey Walker: Nothing tonight Mr. President, thank you.

President Gregory: Mr. Williams.

President Gregory: Mr. Freel.

Mr. Freel: Nothing, thank you.

President Gregory: Ms. Cabrera.

Ms. Cabrera: Yes Mr. President, I have an Ordinance to present and call for the third and final reading.

Mr. Prado: Second.

Ms. Cabrera presented and called for the third and final reading <u>Ordinance</u> No. 14-057 (Agenda #4009) entitled:

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHAPTER 36 OF THE CITY CODE REGARDING DISORDERLY PREMISES

Ms. Cabrera: Yes Mr. President, this is no nonsense common sense law that compliments the existing nuisance laws with the distinctions that it holds those engaged in the disorderly behavior to be held accountable for their actions and extreme behaviors; behavior that disrupts the quality of life in our neighborhoods and throughout our City. The police will be enforcing this law and have the power to do so. It will be at their discretion to determine if the complaint is valid. The persons involved would receive a citation. They have an opportunity to comply and if not there will be fines associated with the behaviors as well as a criminal summons. Everyone is entitled to due process as they would for any criminal offense, go to trial; go to court. The types of behaviors that this is addressing go beyond the noise abatement. It's about the fighting, the brawling on the premises or around property of the premises; the loitering, the dice games that go back, the fighting, the things that spill out into the neighborhood and we have many of these properties where this is occurring in our city. Some of these properties we know are in engaged in criminal behavior. This took a while to come together but it was work of many people that brought this to fruition so that we would have a solid piece of legislation. I would be remised if I don't thank our staff members Tanya Washington, David Karas with the research that they did, my fellow Council Members such as Councilman Chukwuocha with research that he presented that he did with the study in Nebraska - - we looked at best practices across the State; Council Member Freel who is a co-sponsor who was able to provide good advice in terms of what exist with the nuisance laws; the Law Department, Rosamaria. We worked closely with the Attorney General's Office Dan Logan and Mr. Grimm that came to the meetings and we had departments that were involved; both Commissioners of L&I and both Rhodes and Starkey involved in the meetings as well as the Finance Committee; the Police Chief; and even Lenny Sophrin. It was a lot of work from a lot of people to put this together something solid that we could enforce.

President Gregory: Mr. Williams.

Mr. Williams: Thank you Mr. President, while I love the spirit of the law, I just have some reservations and I have some questions to ask in regards to it. On June 19th we passed 39-19 of Chapter 11 and that was without the Councilwoman's support and during the debate that we had was that she said she was the victim of harassment through the noise that officers would drive by and they would not enforce it. Eventually she ended up closing her business. She also stated that there were poorly built homes where the noise would get through the partitions that was the reason why she wouldn't support that. And, I'll quote, "people who are out to get you would do whatever they had to do to get you" and then further on there was some more debate and she stated, "I wanted to work within the current laws, we have a tough times enforcing them" and that was also reiterated by senior Councilman Michael Brown. Through the Committee meeting yesterday we had some discussion that under Title 11, 1301, disorderly conduct which mirrors this legislation, if the police show up and issue a citation for disorderly

conduct, it's valued pointed at six nuisance points. Whereby if this Ordinance is enacted and enforced, it's only valued at four points. What we're doing is we're distinguishing between a residence and a premise. So now, Webster says premise is anything that has the boundaries and business can also be associated. So, I think what we're doing is we're expanding upon 39-19 and encompassing what would be premises. So, in essence what we're doing is we're looking to absolve businesses or bring businesses into the fold through this. So, I have some concerns with that. So, I just - - I have to support this because I won't in six month time completely do a one eighty and having supported mine and then not support this. In my opinion, would just be hypocritical. So, I'm thankful that we're expanding this but I do have those reservations, I do have those questions.

President Gregory: Mr. Brown would like to be added as a sponsor. The Clerk will call the roll. Excuse me, mark Mr. Wright and Mr. Congo present please.

Upon a motion of Ms. Cabrera, seconded by Mr. Prado, the aforementioned Ordinance was read for third and final reading and was adopted by title and section recurring to the Enacting Clause and was passed by the following Yea and Nay Roll Call Vote: Yeas, Council Members Chukwuocha, Congo, Darius Brown, Shabazz, Prado, Dorsey Walker, Williams, Freel, Cabrera, and Wright and Council President Gregory. Total, eleven. Nays, none. Absent, Council Members Michael Brown and Walsh. Total, two.

President Gregory: Declare it adopted.
