# **LEGISLATIVE BUSINESS**

Council Members Gray and Congo did not have any legislation to present this evening.

Council Member Oliver presented and called for the first and second reading Ordinance No. 20-030 (Agenda #4815) entitled:

AN ORDINANCE TO AUTHORIZE A ONE YEAR EXTENSION TO THE EDUCATIONAL ACCESS CHANNEL AGREEMENT BETWEEN RED CLAY CONSOLIDATED SCHOOL DISTRICT AND THE CITY OF WILMINGTON

FISCAL IMPACT STATEMENT: This Ordinance has no anticipated fiscal impact.

The above-referenced Ordinance was given two separate readings by title only and upon a motion of Council Member Oliver, seconded by Council Member Walsh, the Ordinance was received, recorded and referred to the Education, Youth & Families Committee. Motion prevailed.

Council Members Harlee, Turner and McCoy did not have any legislation to present this evening.

Council Member Johnson presented and called for the first and second reading <u>Ordinance No. 20-031</u> (Agenda #4816) entitled:

AN ORDINANCE TO ENACT CERTAIN TRAFFIC/ PARKING REGULATIONS

The above-referenced Ordinance was given two separate readings by title only and upon a motion of Council Member Johnson, seconded by Council Member Walsh, the Ordinance was received, recorded and referred to the Public Works & Transportation Committee meeting. Motion prevailed.

On behalf of President Shabazz, Council Member Johnson presented Resolution No. 20-029 (Agenda #4817) as follows:

WHEREAS, the Equitable Data Collection and Disclosure on COVID-19 Act, sponsored by United States Representative Robin L. Kelly of Illinois, require the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention to collect and report certain data concerning COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, as stated in the Bill, the World Health Organization (WHO) declared COVID-19 a "Public Health Emergency of International Concern" on January 30, 2020. In the United States, cases of COVID-19 have quickly surpassed those across the world, and as of April 12, 2020, over 500,000 cases and 20,000 deaths have been reported in the United States alone; and

WHEREAS, the burden of morbidity and mortality in the United States has historically fallen disproportionately on marginalized communities. That is to say that historically, structures and systems, such as racism, ableism and class oppression, have rendered affected individuals more vulnerable to inequities and have prevented people from achieving their optimal health even when there is not a crisis of pandemic proportions; and

WHEREAS, communities of color experience higher rates of chronic disease and disabilities, such as diabetes, hypertension, and asthma, than non-Hispanic White communities, which predisposes them to greater risk of complications and mortality should they contract COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, communities of color are more likely to generally suffer as a result of lack of access to adequate healthcare, these communities are experiencing alarmingly higher incidences of COVID-19, nationwide and in the State of Delaware, than the majority population; and

WHEREAS, to illustrate this point, in the State of Delaware, according to the State website, <a href="https://myhealthycommunity.dhss.delaware.gov/locations/state">https://myhealthycommunity.dhss.delaware.gov/locations/state</a>, while Hispanic/Latino and Non-Hispanic/Black Delawareans constitute but a small fraction of the state population, however, the incidence of positive incidents within those communities far surpasses those incidents among Non-Hispanic/White Delawareans; and

WHEREAS, the Equitable Data Collection and Disclosure on COVID-19 Act emphasizes that, without clear understanding of how COVID-19 impacts marginalized racial and ethnic communities, there will be exacerbated risk of endangering the most historically vulnerable of our Nation, and for that reason, Emergency Funding for Federal Data Collection on the Racial, Ethnic, and Other Demographic Disparities or COVID-19, has been recommended and should be considered by the United States Congress; and

WHEREAS, such Emergency Funding would make it possible for state and local agencies to conduct or support data collection on the racial, ethnic, and other demographic implications of COVID–19 in the United States and its territories, including support to assist in the capacity building for State and local public health departments to collect and transmit racial, ethnic, and other demographic data to the relevant Department of Health and Human Services agencies; and

WHEREAS, The City of Wilmington, Delaware is not only the largest city in the State of Delaware, but a City with over 50% of its permanent residents self-

identifying as Black, Hispanic and as low-to-moderate income households. The operational shortfalls we will experience by virtue COVID-19 will have real, and possibly long-lasting effects on our City, and the resources afforded to our State agencies to do thorough data collection will be key to our efforts to address public health emergencies caused by COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, by raising our voices, Members of the 107<sup>th</sup> Session of the City Council of the City of Wilmington, Delaware raise our voices, along with leaders of municipalities across the country. We ask that you support H.R. 6585 and that you encourage your colleagues in Washington to do the same.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF WILMINGTON we ask that the United States Congress vote to pass the EQUITABLE DATA COLLECTION AND DISCLOSURE ON COVID-19 ACT, which requires that data collection on racial, ethnic and other demographic implications of COVID-19 in the United States, including support to assist in the capacity building for state and local public health departments to collect and transmit racial, ethnic and other demographic data to the relevant department of health and human services agencies.

Upon a motion of Council Member Johnson, seconded by Council Members Dixon and Walsh, the Resolution was before the Council for its consideration. Council Member Johnson spoke on the purpose of the Resolution and made comments. Council Member Walsh made comments. Council Member Oliver requested to be added as a co-sponsor.

At this time, President Shabazz opened up the floor for public comments and nobody desired the privilege of the floor.

President Shabazz requested the Clerk to call the roll.

The above-referenced Resolution was received, adopted as read and directed to be recorded and filed by the following Yea and Nay Roll Call Vote: Yeas, Council Members Gray, Congo, Oliver, Harlee, Turner, McCoy, Johnson, Adams, Dixon and Walsh, and Council President Shabazz. Total, eleven. Nays, none. Absent, Council Members Freel and Guy. Total, two.

President Shabazz declared the Resolution adopted.

Council Members Adams, Dixon and Walsh did not have any legislation to present this evening.

### PETITIONS AND COMMUNICATIONS

Council President and Council Members spoke on the following: Condolences were expressed to the family of George Floyd; public comment period during legislation; protests/rally in the City of Wilmington as it relates to George Floyd and hopeful of peaceful rally; everyone was reminder that there is still a pandemic and to mindful and safe while out public; food drive announced; the Administration and Council were thanked for listening and helping with movement of the protest; Christina School District referendum; the new Wilmington Strong Fund; small businesses to apply for relief funds; Delaware racism; Town Hall meeting; announcement of committee meeting; the need to wear mask at rally; issues in this country; the tools that we have such as the Charter/Code to maintain order as well as the Civic Association/NPCs, Standing Committees, which are open to the public; and including but not limited to, citizens were encouraged to know and learn the process.
