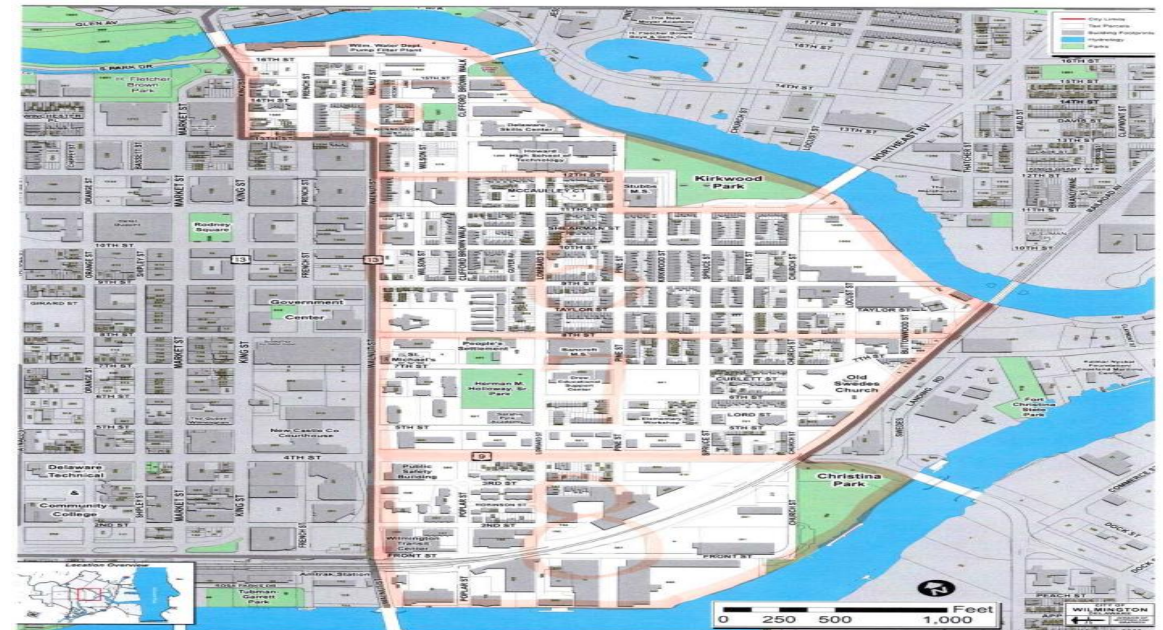
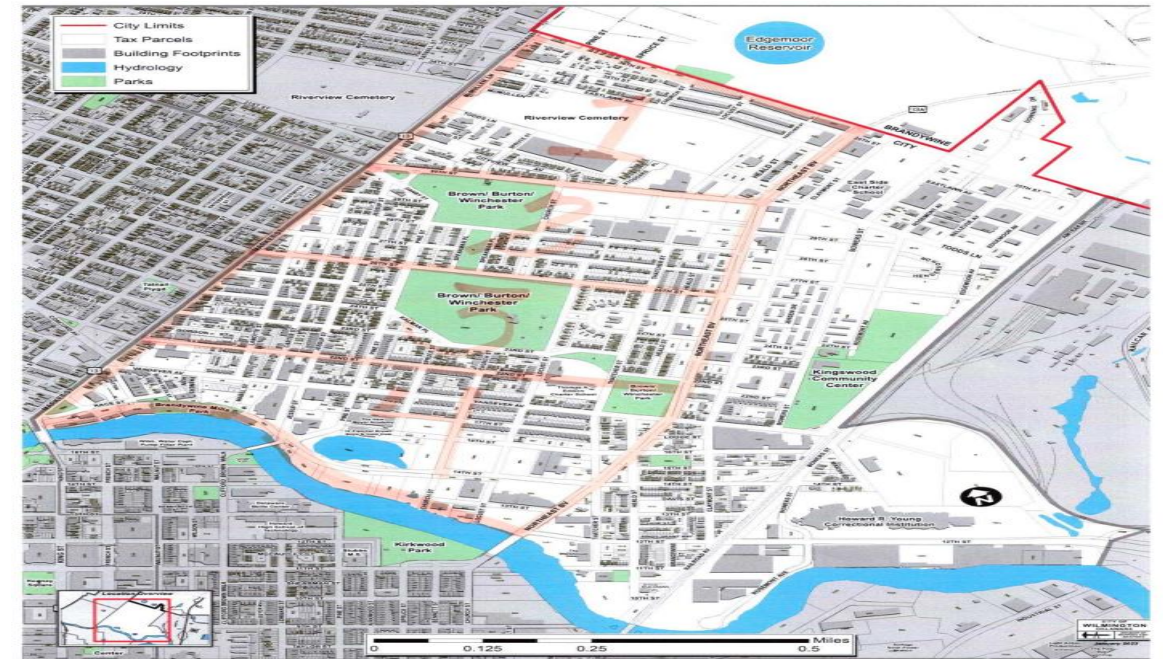

 - Zone 8 - River – 4th & Walnut to Christina Park



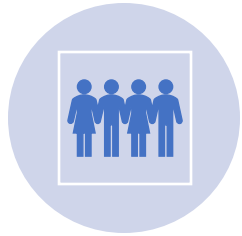
Overview

Safety grows from connection—not enforcement alone.

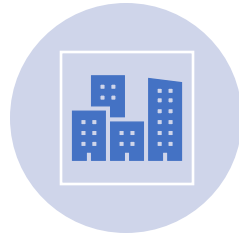

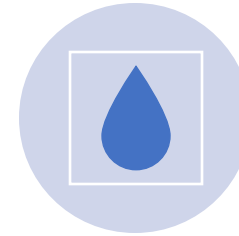

Strengthened Community Presence

- Daily on-the-ground presence across Wilmington neighborhoods.
- Increased resident trust and engagement.
- Positive feedback from community and partners.
- Collaboration with Wilmington Police Department and local organizations.

Outcomes and Trends

- Violent crime decreased significantly:
Murders ↓100% in D11; ↓83% in D13.
- Property crimes slightly increased—focus area for Q4.
- Youth engagement rising (~50% of total contacts).
- Trust and visibility of Street Teams at all-time high.

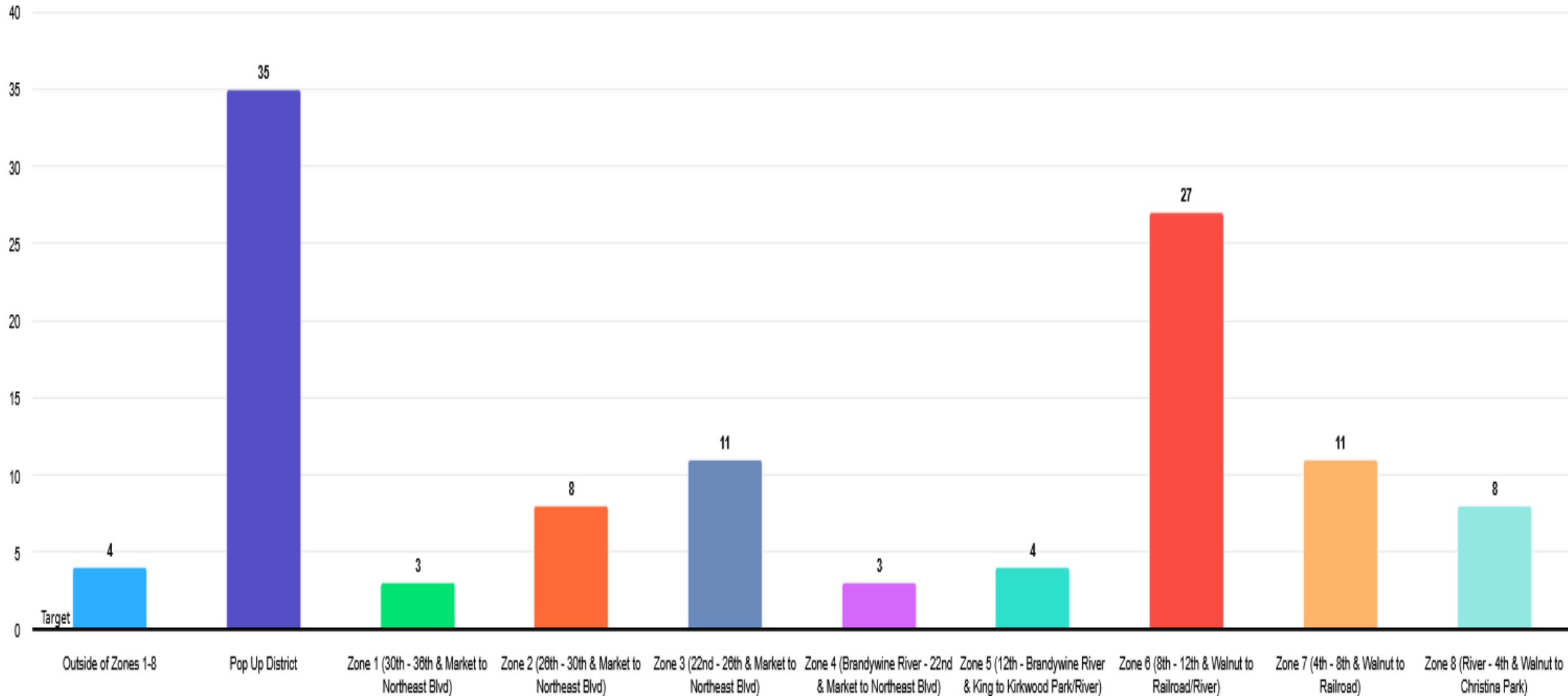

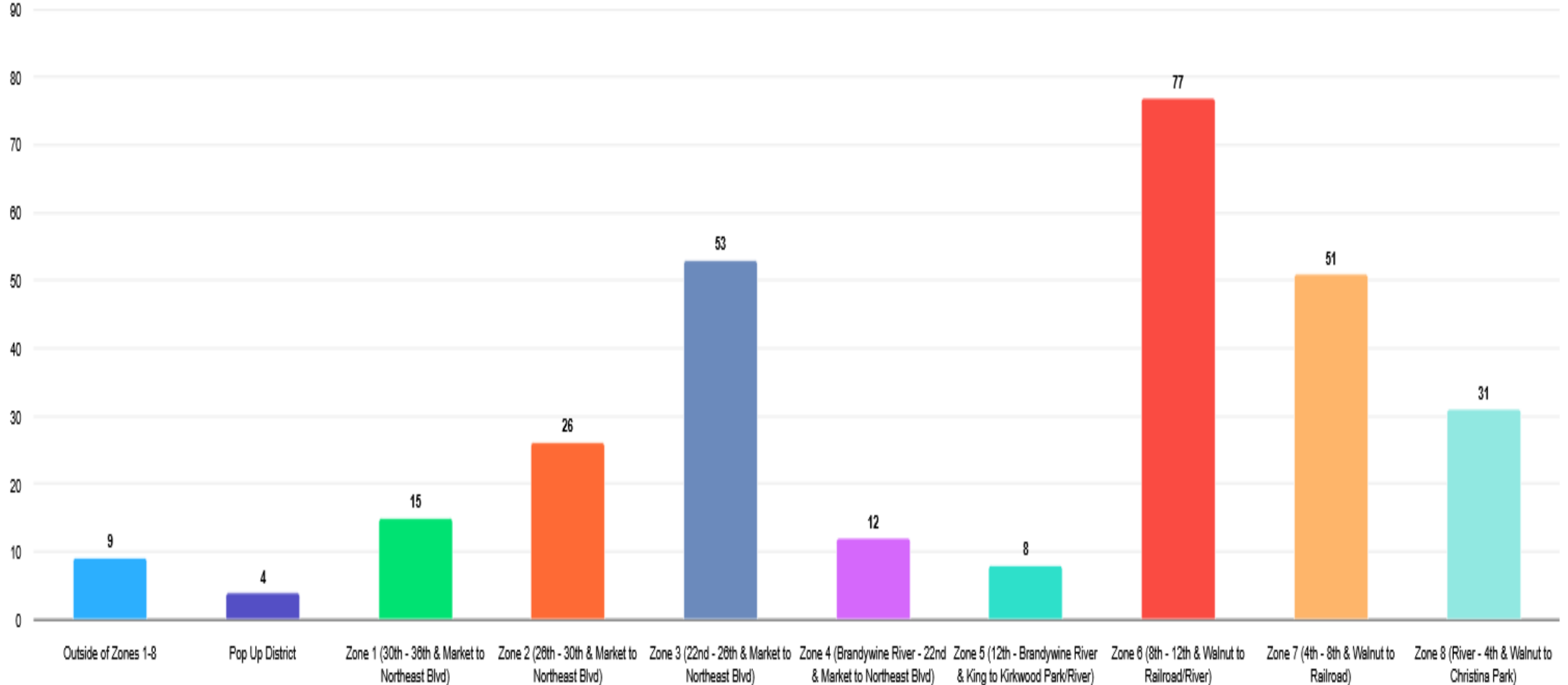

- 35 total incidents recorded (July–September 2025).
 - High Risk: 46%, Medium: 17%, Low: 37%.
 - Most common: Welfare checks, disputes, overdoses.
 - Zone 3: High-risk activity; Zone 6: Preventive engagement.

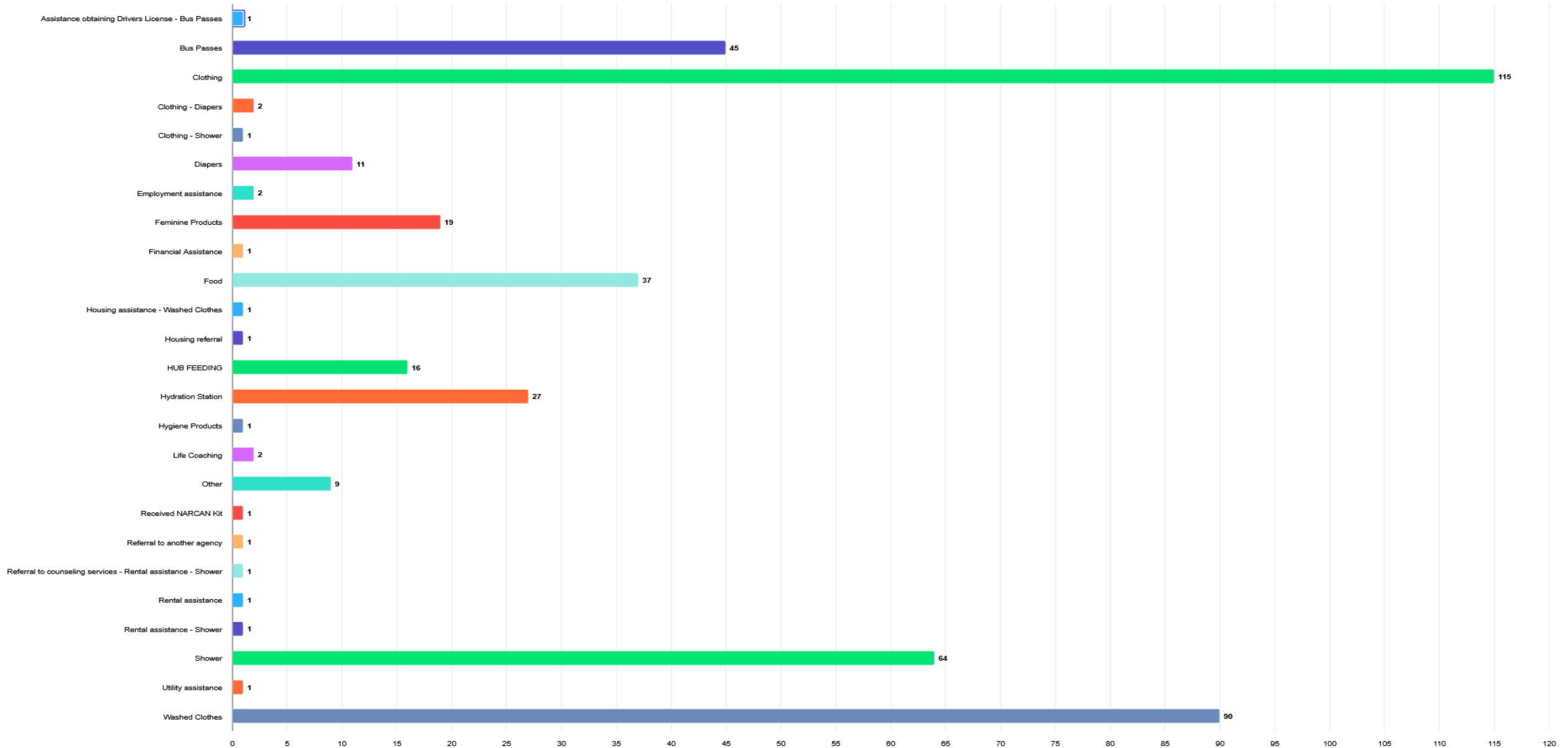

HUBs as Community Anchors

- East Side HUB (914 N. Pine St.): 468 interactions—Top services: Clothing (25%), Laundry (21%), Showers (15%).
- North Side HUB (2214 N. Market St.): 370 interactions—Top services: Food (40%), Showers (20%), Clothing (19%).
- HUBs serve as trusted access points for stability and dignity.

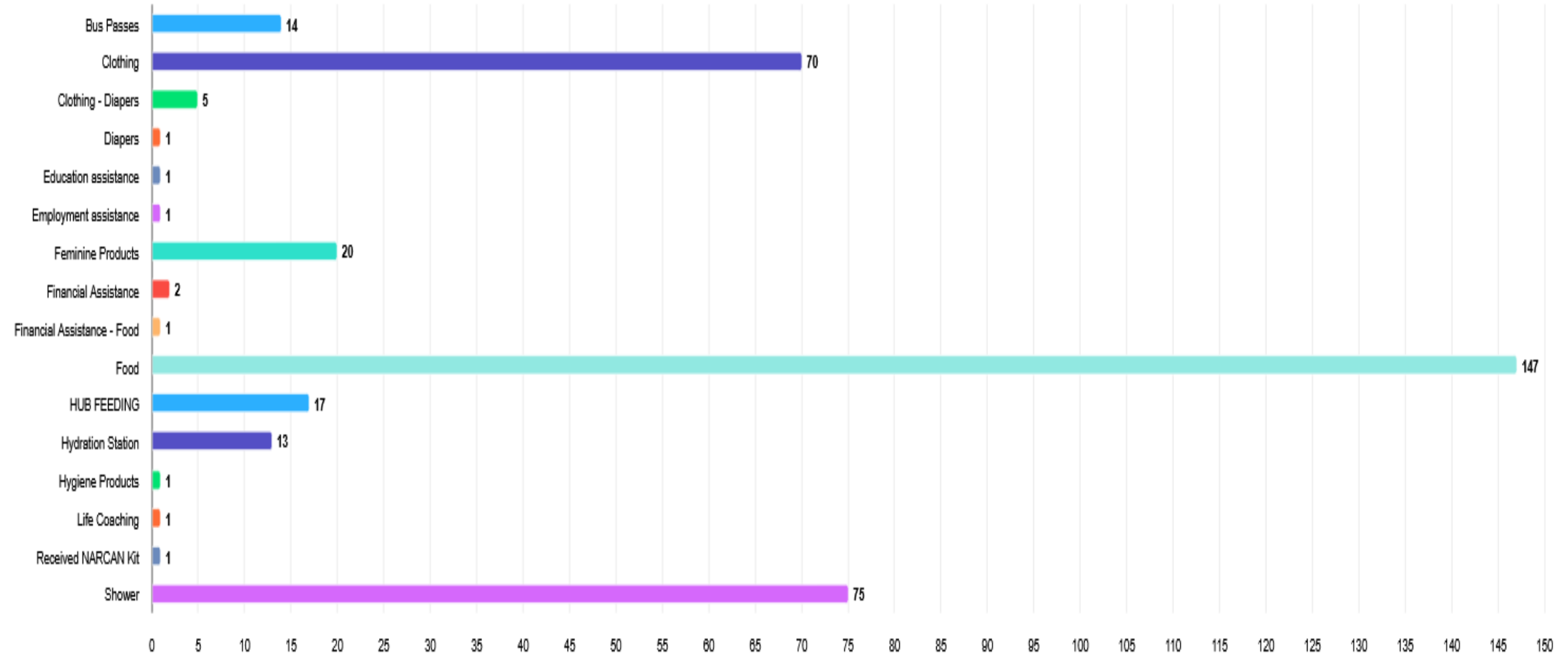

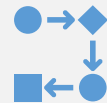
Expand HUB programming and community partnerships.
