Commercial, Manufacturing, and Waterfront Zoning Districts

Enclosed please find a copy of the findings (the "Findings") prepared in connection with Wilmington City Council's ("City Council") scheduled public hearing on May 1, 2025 regarding the above-referenced substitute zoning ordinance (the "Ordinance") to amend Chapter 48 of the City Code (the "Zoning Code"). The Findings supplement the record of the City Planning Commission (the "Planning Commission") and its report, as well as the record of City Council's public hearing, and the Law Department advises their inclusion in the record as a means of complying with Delaware court decisions that involve zoning ordinances of county governments, but the principles of which apply to the City of Wilmington (the "City") as well.

In this instance, the Findings support the provisions of the Ordinance. The Findings and the Ordinance reflect the recommendations approved by the Planning Commission at its regular meeting following its public hearing on March 25, 2025. At that meeting, the Planning Commission approved its Revised Resolution No. 3-25, which recommended the Zoning Code amendments proposed in the Ordinance. The enclosed Findings support those recommendations.

## FINDINGS SUPPORTING THE ENACTMENT OF SUBSTITUTE NO. 1 TO ORDINANCE NO. 25-013

City Council makes the following Findings regarding the proposed amendments to Chapter 48 of the City Code that are the subject of the Ordinance.

#### Proposed Action:

An Ordinance to Amend Chapter 48 of the City Code to Permit the Cultivation, Manufacture, Testing, and Retail of Recreational Marijuana Within Certain Commercial, Manufacturing, and Waterfront Zoning Districts

- 1. The current Zoning Code permits the cultivation, manufacture, testing, and retail of recreational marijuana in certain zoning districts in the City that are not necessarily appropriate for such uses. The proposed amendments address the need to amend the Zoning Code to limit the zoning districts in which such uses will be permitted.
- 2. The proposed amendments will promote the cultivation, manufacture, testing, and retail of recreational marijuana within appropriate zoning districts in the City (namely, the proposed amendments will permit (i) marijuana cultivation facilities, marijuana product manufacturing facilities, marijuana testing facilities, and retail marijuana stores as a matter of right in the C-5 (Heavy Commercial) commercial zoning district, the M-1 (Light Manufacturing) and M-2 (General Industrial) manufacturing and industrial zoning Manufacturing), (Waterfront W-2 (Waterfront and the W-1 districts. (Waterfront Low Intensity W-3 Manufacturing/Commercial), and Manufacturing/Commercial Recreation) waterfront zoning districts and (ii) retail marijuana stores and marijuana testing facilities as special exception uses in the W-4 (Waterfront Residential/Commercial) waterfront zoning district), while prohibiting the four aforementioned marijuana uses from all other zoning districts because the City considers the other zoning districts to be inappropriate for such uses.
- 3. The proposed amendments will promote public safety by requiring a 300-feet buffer zone between any of the four aforementioned marijuana-related uses and residential zoning districts or public and private schools serving any grade between kindergarten and twelfth grade.
- 4. The proposed amendments will provide parking requirements for marijuana product testing facilities because there are no current parking requirements in the Zoning Code for such facilities (parking requirements already exist in the Zoning Code for marijuana cultivation facilities, marijuana product manufacturing facilities, and retail marijuana stores).
- 5. The proposed amendments will incorporate numerous State of Delaware definitions into the Zoning Code, including, but not limited to, definitions for marijuana cultivation facilities, marijuana product manufacturing facilities, marijuana testing facilities, and retail marijuana stores.

- 6. There is no evidence to suggest that the proposed amendments would create any detriment to the public. To the contrary, the proposed amendments should create benefits for the public, including the restriction of recreational marijuana uses from certain zoning districts in the City and the potential development of recreational marijuana businesses within the City in permitted zoning districts.
- 7. The proposed amendments adhere to the standards set forth in the applicable provisions of the Zoning Code, Title 22 of the Delaware Code, Delaware General Assembly House Bill No. 2 entitled "An Act to Amend Titles 4, 11, 16, and 30 of the Delaware Code Relating to the Creation of the Delaware Marijuana Control Act," and applicable Delaware case law.

#### **CONCLUSION**

This concludes the set of City Council's Findings for the proposed amendments to the Zoning Code that are the subject of the Ordinance. The Ordinance incorporates the recommendations of the Planning Commission regarding the proposed amendments to the Zoning Code, which were approved at the Planning Commission meeting on March 25, 2025 and contained in its Revised Resolution 3-25.

A RESOLUTION URGING THE DELAWARE GENERAL ASSEMBLY TO ENACT LEGISLATION THAT WILL AMEND TITLE 22 CHAPTERS 9 OF THE DELAWARE CODE TO ENABLE THE CITY OF WILMINGTON TO IMPOSE EXCISE TAX OF UP TO 3% ON THE SALE OF MARIJUANA AND MARIJUANA PRODUCTS BY A RETAIL MARIJUANA STORE LOCATED WITHIN THE BOUNDARIES OF THE CITY, IN ADDITION TO ANY AMOUNTS IMPOSED BY THE STATE

Synopsis: This Resolution is being presented by City Council for Council's review and approval. This Resolution urges the Delaware General Assembly to enact legislation that will amend Title 22 (Municipalities), Chapter 9 (Municipal User Tax) of the Delaware Code to enable the City of Wilmington to impose a local excise tax of up to 3% on the sale of marijuana and marijuana products by a retail marijuana store located within the boundaries of the City, in addition to any amounts imposed by the State. The State's Retail Marijuana Tax rate is 15%. The additional revenue generated by the local marijuana excise tax would be allocated to bolster the City's capacity to develop holistic support systems that benefit the high concentration of Disproportionately Impacted Areas (DIAs) in the City.

Upon a motion of Council Member Johnson, seconded by Council Members McCoy and Owens, the Resolution was before the Council for its consideration. Motion prevailed. Council Member Johnson spoke to the purpose of the resolution and made comments. Council Members Oliver, Hackett, Cabrera, Owens, Bracy, Willauer and President Congo made comments and requested to be added as a cosponsor.

President Congo requested the Clerk to call for the roll.

The above-referenced Resolution was received, adopted as read and recorded to be filed by the following Yea and Nay Roll Call Vote: Yeas, Council Members Owens, Oliver, Willauer, McCoy, Johnson, Field, Bracy, Hackett, Spadola and President Congo. Total, eleven. Absent, Council Members Darby and Harlee. Total, two.

President Congo declared the Resolution adopted.

Council Member Owens presented on behalf of Council Member Darby, and called for the first and second reading Ordinance No. 25-019 (Agenda #0046) entitled:
